Newly Enrolled Cadets

With new cadets enrolling, we have made accessing the cadet Quarterdeck and the Parent Portal easier for families and more functional for home units. As of 01 JAN 2024, all newly enrolling cadets and their primary parent will receive an email from HQ with their cadet ID number and instructions to create their online accounts. HQ video instruction is included in the email.



Welcome aboard to our newest *home unit name* family. In starting this new adventure, the Cadet ID number *here* is your key to many of our activities. In the next few days, the tasks below will need to be completed in order to take the first steps of being a part of the Sea Cadets.

Cadet *name* you will need to create your Quarterdeck account and start your first Polaris course with your ID number. *Parent Name* you will use the cadet ID number to create your Parent Portal. This Parent Portal is the location that houses your cadet's personal information. The same information provided in the cadet application is needed when moving through the login process. Training Fee Increase Effective 01 FEB 2024

As part of our commitment to providing top-notch cadet trainings, we want to inform you of an upcoming adjustment to our training fees. Over the past two years, we have experienced the rising costs of doing business due to the impact of inflation. These external factors have led to increased expenses in various aspects of our cadet training operations, including but not limited to venue rentals, rental vehicles, lodging, food, training supplies, etc. In order to maintain the high quality standards you expect from Sea Cadet training programs, we find it necessary to implement a cadet training fee increase. This adjustment will take effect on 01 FEB 2024.

We understand that changes in pricing may raise questions, and we want to assure you that this decision was made after careful consideration. Our priority remains delivering value-driven training that equips cadets with the skills and knowledge needed for success. We look forward to serving you with excellence in the upcoming training season. Typically, cadet training fees will follow the schedule below; however, specialty training may have a higher cadet training fee.

Number of Days	Fees
1 Days	\$ 30.00
2 Days	\$ 60.00
3-4 Days	\$ 100.00
5-7 Days	\$ 250.00
8-9 Days	\$ 300.00
10+ Plus Days	\$ 350.00

Generally, trainings of 5+ days are overnight and necessary for promotion credit; thus, training fees correspond with the length of training.

Note: High-cost trainings like SCUBA, sailing, or aviation programs will typically charge a higher fee than those outlined above.

Chief Advancement Boards

In our Spring 2023 Policy update, Sea Cadet Chief Petty Officer Advancement Boards were to begin nationwide on 01 JAN 2024; but to better prepare cadets and home units with this process, the start date has been pushed back to Friday, 01 MAR 2024. HQ will issue guidance and further instructions in early 2024.

Today in Naval History

January 12

1953 - Aircraft landings begin operational tests, day and night, onboard USS Antietam (CVA-36), the first angled flight deck carrier.

USS Antietam (CV/CVA/CVS-36) was one of 24 Essex-class aircraft carriers built during and shortly after World War II for the United States Navy. The ship was the second US Navy ship to bear the name, and was named for the American Civil War Battle of Antietam (Maryland). Antietam was commissioned in January 1945, too late to serve actively in World War II. After serving a short time in the Far East, she was decommissioned in 1949. She was soon recommissioned for Korean War service, and in that conflict earned two battle stars. In the early 1950s, she was redesignated an attack carrier (CVA) and then an antisubmarine warfare carrier (CVS). After the Korean War she spent the rest of her career operating in the Atlantic, Caribbean, and Mediterranean. From 1957 until her deactivation, she was the Navy's training carrier, operating out of Florida.

Today in Naval History (Continued)

Antietam was fitted with a port sponson in 1952 to make her the world's first true angled-deck aircraft carrier. However, she received no major modernizations other than this, and thus throughout her career largely retained the classic appearance of a World War II Essex-class ship. She was decommissioned in 1963, and sold for scrap in 1974. en.wikipedia.org
